Introduction to Johanna Road Informal Settlement



- 200 250 households
- 10km from Durban City Centre
- 65.4% women*
- 66.4% single parents*
- 43.3% of households do not have at least one person employed
- 88.5% of households believe disposal of solid waste and management of rubbish to be problematic

*of 103 respondents of Africa AHEAD baseline survey

Objective of the Project

to improve the living standard of residents of this informal settlement

to provoke clean up of solid waste



To reuse grey water using agritubes



Measurement of Progress

Two surveys where done, before and after the 6 month project

100 households observed

Observation of:

Water storage
Food hygiene
Waste disposal
Open defecation
Hand washing
Grey water reuse
Solid waste disposal



Impiloyethu and Sakhimpiloyethu

Two health clubs formed in July 2009

58 registered members, mainly women

Representing ¼ of all household in settlement





Club Activities

Clean up of Solid Waste, and Grey Water Sullage

Involved the whole community, but organised by health club members


Communal Ablution Blocks


Community Health Club volunteer to clean up Ablution Blocks Agri-tubes given to all active CHC Members to start gardens








Behaviour Change at 3 - Months












After 3 months most had moved to MEDIUM or HIGH level of safe hygiene practice

CHC members had higher standard of hygiene than non CHC members

Behaviour Change Among CHC Members Baseline, 3-month and 6-month

7% who praticed open defecation at base line to 100% with ZERO OPEN DEFCATION
