

## Chairperson's 2022 Report: Dr. Juliet Waterkeyn



A little over five years since Africa AHEAD relocated from the United Kingdom back to our roots in Zimbabwe in 2018, the organisation has sustained phenomenal growth for the fourth year running, with an average of around one million beneficiaries per year for the past four years. This is all the more admirable given an environment where many local NGOs are finding it difficult to survive. I am proud to report that our organisation has become the 'go to' organisation for international organisations seeking to achieve the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) through community-led development through Community Health Clubs.

Since its formation the focus of Africa A.H.E.A.D (**Applied Health Education and Development**) has operated solidly within the WASH Sector, focused primarily on behaviour change in hygiene within water and sanitation programmes (SDG 6). With the urgent need to enable communities to be resilient against global warming (SG 7), we are formally extending the scope of Community Health Clubs to ensure food sustainability (STD 2) which coupled with SDG 6 will ensure Good Health (SDG 3) and Poverty Reduction (SDG 1). Therefore in 2022, the Board agreed to change the 'A.D' in the acronym to signify **Agriculture for Development** to capture our work on the empowerment of women (SDG 5) through income generation (SGD 8) in agricultural projects. The more holistic design of our projects this year can be appreciated at a glance by the 'SDG train' in each page in this Annual Report, which shows which 'Sustainable Development Goals' (SDGs) are being simultaneously addressed in each project.

The good governance of the organisation has been further strengthened in the past year by welcoming Victor Nyamandi, Director of the Environmental Health Department as a Trustee, an appropriate addition to the Board since he was the District Health Office when the first CHCs were started in Makoni District in 1994. He replaces our loyal Trustee Sally Kuiper who retires, having been of great support over the past few years as signatory for the Board.

Africa AHEAD is now a truly home-grown NGO, managed **by Zimbabweans for Zimbabweans** whilst striving for a level of excellence which is more often associated with better resourced international organisations. Once again we have a clean bill of health from our auditors.

The following pages give so much detail it is hard to believe this was all achieved in the past year by our Executive Director and his dedicated team.



### **Executive Director's 2022 Report Regis Matimati**

2022 was a memorable year for the organization as we crisscrossed the length and breadth of the country in 15 districts, pursuing our mission of excellence in health services delivery and sustainable community development, while hopefully growing in stature and in wisdom.

ACF, Oxfam, Care International, SKAT Foundation and UNICEF continued to be our bedrock upon which we built our success. Thanks to their partnership we managed to reach out to around a million program participants through Community Health Clubs, piped water schemes, livestock dipping facilities and solarization of health care facilities in seven of the country's 10 provinces with a budget of \$3,6 million US\$ in 2022. All this was achieved with a staff of 56 dedicated community workers.

My Senior Management team is any director's envy as they live their work resulting in one program success after another as will be shown in this report. Although my staff made it all seem like a walk in the park, I am well aware of the gruesome roads they travelled, and the extra hours they put into their work but the happy faces of the community members when the inputs were transformed into outcomes with the eventual impact was our reward.

We thank the many government stakeholders out there who gave us all the support required to achieve our targets. Resources permitting, we will not think twice about going back to put shoulder to the wheel with them as we better our communities.

The Board of Trustees provided an enabling environment for me and my team to thrive. We are eternally indebted to their oversight on the organization.

The support from donors, government of Zimbabwe, AA board and the communities is overwhelming and we have no reason to ever down our tools. A national outlook and local work defined our drive in 2022, thinking globally of the many threats of climate change whilst acting locally to protect our community for it's effect. The Africa AHEAD team will be active as long as the needs are there in the community.

#### Staff Capacity Building and Training

We were able to conduct trainings covering prevention of sexual exploitation and abuse (PSEA) all the staff and received their certificates. This was done through a cascade training approach were PSEA focal persons were identified, trained and then rolled out the trainings. This has helped us to meet the UN(UNICEF) requirements for our partnership and also instill a good working culture among our teams.



#### **Value for Money Analysis**

In order to get a simple indication of the 'value for money' we use a rough guide of cost per beneficiary. This is calculated by dividing the total **budget received** for each project in the year by the **number of people who have benefitted** in some way as a result of this expenditure.

'Beneficiaries' are divided into different categories as we realise that the difference in degree of input may be substantial. Therefore we have divided all WASH inputs into the following categories: 1.School Health Clubs and Community Health Clubs, 2.WASH Infrastructure, 3. Emergency and 4 Miscellaneous training. NB. If we did not have exact project records of number of beneficiaries, we used an estimate - all on a conservative side - as follows:

- School Health Clubs or Community Health Clubs: 25 members average (smaller due to Covid restrictions) x 5 per household
- Borehole or piped water scheme: average of 50 households x 5 per households,
- School water supply: an average of 300 pupils per school (not including their families)
- Health Centre Rehabilitation: 2000 catchment households x 5 per household\* for population benefitting
- Emergency Inputs include NFI kits or MHK counted as one per individual (not x 5 per household) or other types of one off donation in kind
- **Miscellaneous Training** includes all training except CHC or SHC, i.e. DWSCC, WPUC, VPM, CHW,VHW, all HCF staff and all village leaders, and other emergency training such as IPC (not x 5 per family)
- Social Marketing such as weekly radio broadcasts, or road shows, as well as number of recorded hits on social media of those watching skits.

  NB. These 'beneficiaries' are not included in the overall calculation of cost per beneficiary as long term impact is not measurable.
